In that case, the firm obtained a verdict in excess of \$10,600,000 for Rebekah Zakrocki, who suffered a complete brachial plexus injury in a rollover of a Ford Explorer. Darren Penn, the managing partner of the firm, speaks of trial with excitement. "We expect that every case that comes into our office will go to trial and we look forward to that," says Penn.
